

- Demographic data included


















If you were a victim of crime in the last 3 years, did you report it to the police?






When you reported a crime to SAPS, they arrived at the crime scene on average:






When you phoned the police station, how long on average did it take for your call to be answered?






When you go to your local police station, on average, how long do you have to wait before you are attended to?






7. The last time you visited your local police station, were you served in the language of your choice (being either isiXhosa, English or Afrikaans)?






8. If you have ever opened a case with the police, how often, on average, did the police provide you with progress reports on their investigation?






9. During the last week, when did you see SAPS patrolling your area?








11. How do you rate the level of professionalism of SAPS in your area?






12. In your opinion, how professional is the provision of victim support / counselling services at your local police station?






13. If you have ever received counselling via victim support services, how professionally was your referral handled?






14. If you are involved in partnerships against crime, please indicate the formations / structures you are most actively involved in:






15. Do you think there are enough police resources (e.g. police officers, equipment etc.) for your community?






16. Do you think that police resources are being utilised effectively / optimally at your local station?






17. Based on your experience, indicate your top priority policing / safety needs in your local police station






18. In your opinion, how would you rate the effectiveness of the witness protection programme?








20. In your opinion, what is the main contributor of crime?






21. In your opinion, what is the main motivator of crime?












