Traffic law enforcement

DTPW takes continual action to reduce the death toll from fatal road crashes by enforcing traffic legislation, including roadblocks and random breath testing to combat driving under the influence.



Road safety

- **4 854** speed control operations were conducted
- **3 007** driving under the influence control operations were conducted
- 1 112 071 vehicles were stopped and checked
- **574** safety awareness programmes were undertaken
- 423 schools were involved in road safety education programmes
- South Africa's first Mobile Alcohol Evidentiary Unit was launched to test blood alcohol levels of drivers on the spot.

- **383** compliance inspections were conducted
- 105 taxi associations held annual general meetings






Job creation through the EPWP

Education infrastructure

DTPW is the implementing agent for Western Cape Education Department infrastructure.





The Western Cape Government (WCG) is committed to ensuring that all children with special needs and disabilities receive an education that allows them to achieve their full potential. Opened in January 2018, the new Cheré Botha LSEN (Learners with Special Educative Needs) School in Bellville caters for 165 learners with severe intellectual disability and 130 learners with autism spectrum disorder.



Health infrastructure

As the implementing agent for the provincial Department of Health, DTPW builds and maintains hospitals and clinics.





The new Hillside Clinic in Beaufort West contains the most "green" features facility in the Western Cape. Rammed earth walls and underground rock stores reduce the need for air conditioning by mitigating temperature extremes (high temperatures during the day, and cold temperatures at night). The design also features optimised natural daylight, energy-efficient heating, and a borehole for irrigating the water-wise garden.



Property management

The purpose of DTPW Provincial Public Works is to provide balanced provincial government building infrastructure that promotes integration, accessibility, sustainability, equity, environmental sensitivity, economic growth, and social empowerment.

In 2017/18, the 6th annual Property Efficiency Report (PER) reported an increase in workspace efficiency of 7,6 per cent in the previous year, as well as decreases in energy consumption of 6 per cent and reduced water consumption in the amount of 20 per cent across a range of 35 selected office buildings in the DTPW portfolio.





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
