

To my mind Christmas, unlike Keats's autumn, is a season, of lists rather than mists. We all make Christmas card lists, present-buying lists, and shopping lists for the holiday meals. Magazine pages are full of suggestion lists of gifts. The bookshops have the Ama-Boek list, and their Publishers Choice. Reviewing pages have their lists of the 'Ten Best' or whatever; or get celebrities to list their reading choices. Even the **Cape Librarian** has been known, on occasion, to publish lists of the 'Ten Best'.



BETWEEN THE LINES

haunt me in the weeks to come. No, this is a list of some of the books I have read and enjoyed over the past year.

I will start by cheating a bit. The year began with a re-reading of two previous Booker winners in preparation for a series of summer school lectures: Ian McEwan's **Atonement** and Margaret Atwood's **The blind assassin**. As these have both received a good deal of attention since they first appeared, I will say only that both are deeply satisfying works, finely nuanced and densely layered, and amply repaid a second reading.

Last year's Booker winner, by Yann Martel, **The life of Pi**, is the tale of a teenage Indian boy stranded on a lifeboat in the Pacific for 277 days with a Bengal tiger. I have to confess that I picked this up with some reluctance. I started it because I felt I ought to - and then could hardly put it down. Mike Berger's review in the **Cape Times** perfectly sums up my feelings about it. He says: 'I cannot remember ever having encountered so much wit, sympathy, insight, heart-pounding tension, intellectual verve and, above all, sheer narrative skill within the covers of a single book...the author uses this epic of human endurance to introduce themes one would not expect to encounter in an adventure tale. The more obvious are animal behaviour, animal-human relationships, religion, the relationship between religion and science, the nature of reality and how to survive in a cruel and uncaring world... If it doesn't leave you feeling inspired and elated with a renewed belief in human possibility - be afraid, very afraid.'

Top of the local pops, in my view, is **The children's day**, by Stellenbosch academic Michiel Heyns. This is a very serious book. Unlike other South African novels addressing serious issues, however, it is neither heavy nor portentous, but has a lightness of touch, and is so filled with delicacy and wit that it is a pleasure to read. It is an account of the childhood and adolescence of a boy growing up in the imaginary Free State dorp of Verkeerdespruit. It is a marvellous evocation of small town South Africa, its characters, their lives and outlook, told with ironic wryness and magnificently controlled understatement.

Alexander McCall Smith has written a novel set in Botswana. Many readers will know him as a children's writer. Apparently he is also connected to the Faculty of Law at the University of Edinburgh, and, as becomes clear in this novel, **The No 1 ladies'**

detective agency, he has spent time in Botswana, where he has come to love and understand the country and its people. This is the tale of Mma Ramoetse, who, on her father's death, inherits his cattle. Obeying his instructions, she sells the herd, and sets up a business with the proceeds, although not quite the business he had in mind. In the best tradition of Agatha Christie's Miss Marple, she establishes a detective agency, and sets out to solve the problems of the locals, using her homespun philosophy and shrewd knowledge of human nature. The simple directness of its narration gives this work enormous charm.

Rohinton Mistry is yet another Booker winner, for his novel **A fine balance**. His next novel, **Family matters**, is the account of the everyday lives of three generations of a Parsee family. Told with humour and pathos, it is also a portrait in microcosm of modern India. I found myself laughing and weeping in turns.

Sarah George's **The bee-keeper's pupil** is set against the background of the eighteenth century Enlightenment, and is based on the life of the Swiss naturalist, Francois Hubert. He began to go blind as a teenager, and was completely blind by the age of nineteen. This did not blunt his keenly analytical mind, nor his scientific curiosity, however, and he commenced a lifelong study of the habits of bees. He trained his manservant to make the necessary observations, and together they recorded and analysed their discoveries. It is narrated in diary form by the manservant, no less an interesting character than his master. Besides the wealth of fascinating information about bees and scientific methods, this is a moving portrait of a friendship, a study of the domestic life of the time, and a warm and tender love story. I will make a point of looking out for George's previous novel **Mrs Pepys's diary**.

The dive from Clausen's Pier is an accomplished, engrossing first novel by Ann Packer. Twenty-three-year-old Carrie is engaged to her first and only sweetheart, Mike. She is already bored and frustrated with her life when tragedy overtakes them: Mike dives into the shallow waters of the lake and breaks his neck, becoming a quadriplegic. This is about love and friendship, duty and freedom, choices and guilt, and how Carrie deals with these issues.

I have discovered two new crime writers this year, both worth adding to my list of favourites. The first is a Swedish writer, Henning Mankell, whose bleak, gritty police procedurals feature the rather cynical detective Kurt Wallender. I have recently read **One step behind**, and will certainly go back to read the others in this series.

The other is a new (to me) British writer, Peter Robinson, whose detective Alan Banks operates in the Yorkshire Dales, evocatively described. After reading **In a dry season**, **Cold is the grave**, **Aftermath** and **The summer that never was**, I would rate Banks up there with my other favourite detectives - Michael Dibdin's Aurelio Zen, Ian Rankin's John Rebus, John Harvey's Charlie Resnick and, of course, Morse.

This is a fairly random selection - some recently published, some older titles. As I mentioned earlier, I cannot call this a list of the best titles I have read this year. I do not keep lists of what I read, although sometimes I think it might be a good idea to do so. There may well be something outstanding which I have failed to mention - I find that the 'senior moments' are becoming alarmingly more frequent. All I can say is that all the titles mentioned are books which I enjoyed and can recommend as deeply satisfying reads.


Totsiens aan 'n groot gees

Macassar 21 jaar oud

Macassar Biblioteek het in September 2003 sy 21ste bestaansjaar gevier. Hierdie geskiedkundige gebeurtenis is in die plaaslike koerante gevier en het die wye belangstelling van die gemeenskap ontlok. Met die kultuuraand het skoliere van Firgrove die gehoor verras met voordrag en sang van hoogstaande gehalte. (Foto op bladsy 7) Hul vertolking van Kaap-Maleise liedjies wat Afrikaanse kultuurbesit geword het, het die verbeelding van die gehoor aangevry. Die boodskap van die gasspreker, Ria Olivier, was dat kinders hul beste moet lewer en voluit deur Afrikaans moet leef. Sy het onderwysers aangemoedig om as vennote van die biblioteek die stryd teen ongeletterdheid in Macassar aan te sê. Die hoogtepunt van die feesvieringe was 'n

gedenkdiens in die stampvol biblioteeksaal. Raadslid Magerman van die Helderberg Owerheid het in sy openingsrede die biblioteek geloof as baken, inligtingsentrum en simbool van hoop in Macassar. Die dankdiens is geleei deur ds N Williams wat as kind 'n biblioteekgebruiker was. Kerse is na afloop van die diens aangestek ter gedagtenis aan die personeellede wat ontslaap het. Ná afsluiting van die verrigtinge het die biblioteekpersoneel die gaste onthaal.

Dickens and Rowling go head to head

A shortlist of the 21 books which the British public has voted to be the greatest works ever written has been published by the BBC.

The list includes works by Charles Dickens, George Orwell and Charlotte and Emily Brontë as well as contemporary authors such as JK Rowling and Philip Pullman.

Among those omitted are literary greats including Thomas Hardy and James Joyce and foreign novelists such as Gustave Flaubert and Victor Hugo whose masterpieces were also eligible for the list having been translated into English.

The 21 books will now be included in a new round of voting, which will result in one of the works receiving the accolade of the nation's favourite read.

The BBC banned any author from appearing more than once on the shortlist of titles, choosing only the novel which scored the highest number of votes for each writer.

Mystery of book lost for 400 years

An unrecorded Elizabethan book detailing the basics of the Christian faith has been found discarded behind oak panelling at a country estate, where it is likely to have lain undiscovered for 400 years. **L'ABC des Chrestiens** was found by a joiner during restoration work at Hardwick Hall, Derbyshire.

The book was published in 1583 by a French protestant but no record of it has been found. The French language catechism is believed to be a children's text book and was probably put behind the panelling by a youngster eager to lose it.

The National Trust, which owns Hardwick Hall, said the find was remarkable.

Nigel Wright, the collections manager, said: 'It is exciting, both on the academic and human interest level.'

'It is a really important book because it is unknown to scholarship. It contains passages that children were likely to have had to learn off by heart, such as, "I will renounce the devil".'

40 years ago

- ★ The last two editions of 1963 of the **Cape Librarian** focused on music in the library, with no less than seven articles on the subject! In the editorial the editor complained about popular music and described it as mechanised sounds which can be released simply by pushing a button or putting a coin in a juke-box. And it was the role of the library to expose the youth to good music rather than the 'cheap brand of popular mechanised sound'.
- ★ En wat is goeie musiek? 'n Hele lange lys word verskaf van boeke wat handel oor orkeste, klaviere, dirigiekuns, instrumente en musiekwaardering...
- ★ Back in 1963 it was also a struggle to get kids into the library. Tip from Cathcart: Approach your school and ask the teachers to get the kids to write an essay on 'Why I like to go the library'.
- ★ Oorspronklike kinderboeke in Afrikaans was maar baie skaars, uit 17 nuwe titels wat die Biblioteekdiens gedurende die laaste twee maande van 1963 aangekoop het, was 'n hele 14 vertaalde werke.
- ★ Ideas for Christmas displays. During a discussion forum librarians presented their ideas on this subject. Suggestions varied from 'Let's fight the trashy, zany commercial Christmas' (Mrs B Gertz); 'It is a time for leisure, for reading, and for staving off boredom for many' (Mr D Anderson). One of Mrs EM Gillard's many practical suggestions: 'Do remember that not everybody will be having the traditional Christmas dinner. Include a book on fat-free cookery so that those on diet can also have a look-in.'


God Little, even sold a friend's flat and kept the proceeds.

US Consulate donates

In response to an ongoing interest in the African-American experience, the United States Consulate in Cape Town launched an annual book donation programme to public libraries on African-American life, literature, history and culture. In September, we made the first two donations to the Mitchell's Plain Town Centre Library in Cape Town, and the Galeshewe Public Library in Kimberley. The programme in Kimberley coincided with their launch of the Africa Writer's Series collection, and formed part of their Heritage Day celebrations. Among the eighteen titles we donated to each library were classics, such as Richard Wright's *Native son*, contemporary novels, such as Toni Morrison's *Sula*, and recently released non-fiction such as the new biography about Condoleezza Rice. We will be making the third donation in the Port Elizabeth area in the next few months. Next year, we will be donating a different set of titles (about 15-25 books each) to three different public libraries in each Cape



Harry Potter goes green

Author JK Rowling has promised to have the next Harry Potter book printed on recycled paper.

Rowling is among several popular British authors who have pledged to use 'environmentally and socially responsible sources', the **Times** reports, noting that the Potter novels have already consumed about 6,5 million trees. New techniques pioneered in Canada allow wastepaper to be used to make books, it says.

The Canadian edition of **Harry Potter and the order of the phoenix**, the latest book, was printed on recycled paper - saving about 40 000 trees.

The **Times** says several publishers are unwittingly buying paper from Finland and Canada, two of the world's ancient forest areas.

Despite the high cost of developing recycled paper strong and white enough for books, there will not necessarily be a price rise as publishers are likely to recover their costs by using more basic covers.

In a message to Canadian readers, Rowling said: 'The forest at Hogwarts is home to magical creatures like unicorns and centaurs. Because (your) editions are printed on ancient forest-friendly paper, the Harry Potter books are helping to save magnificent forests in the muggle world.'

'It is a good idea to respect ancient trees, especially if they have a temper like the Whomping Willow.'
