New head of department

Mr Rod Solomons, well known in his previous as capacity director of Sport in the Western Cape has been appointed as the new head of the department of Cultural Affairs and Sport.

39 years old Solomons, a man of many talents qualified with a B.Soc.Sc. at the University of Cape Town, (UCT) and a LLB Degree from the University of the Western Cape (UWC). He also holds a certificate in Sports Law and has been admitted as an advocate of the High Court of South Africa.

He headed sport and recreation in the Western Cape since 1995 (having created the department from scratch) and was previously involved in labour research at UCT. Solomons also initiated a number of projects within the department such as the establishment of the Western Cape Sports Academy; the establishment of the Western Cape Coaches' Association; the launching of a *Sports against crime* campaign; the drawing up of a Western Cape Sports Facilities Plan; the launching of an Active and Healthy Western Cape Campaign; the publishing of a marketing and sponsorship guide to sports federations; and the inclusion of women in sport structures.

He was also involved in human resource management for a number of years and has attended various management courses. He received management training in foreign countries, such as the United Kingdom (UK) and Botswana.

Before the 1994 general election he was involved in the Transitional Executive Council (TEC) where he, inter alia, had to attend to the minimum requirements necessary for the functioning of provincial governments after the elections:

- ~ arranged the first sitting of the Provincial Parliament of the Western Cape
- ~ coordinated the ceremony around the raising of the new South African flag and the lowering of the old one
- ~ was part of a task team investigating aspects of a new public service in a post-apartheid South Africa.

After the 1994 general election, he was



part of the strategic management team of the then Ministry of Nature Conservation, Environment and Tourism in the Western Cape and acted as adviser to the minister.

Solomons acted as chairperson of the South African National Boxing Control Commission by the National Minister of Sport and Recreation for approximately two years with a brief to revitalise and

professionally manage the body. He makes regular strategic contributions to the transformation of the public service in South Africa and is much involved in advising black professionals on economic matters.

He also had the pleasure and the privilege to serve on both the board and the executive committee of the Cape Town 2004 Olympic Bid Committee. He was the co-chair of the White-Bread Round the World Race - Cape Town stop-over. He coordinated the Olympic

Bid project within the provincial government and was a coordinator of the 2006 Soccer World Cup Bid within the Western Cape. He is currently chairing the Western Cape Committee responsible for the coordination of the 2003 Cricket World Cup in the Western Cape.

He serves on a number of professional bodies like the Interim Western Cape Tourism Board; the Western Cape Sports Academy; et cetera. He has delivered numerous papers at conferences and workshops and has a keen interest in environmental, tourism, economic and leisure-related matters.

His commitment to the transformation of our society and affinity with the poor is unchallenged. He enjoys playing sport, photography, studying, attending cultural events, outdoor excursions, reading, jazz and classical music.

Siena will not only be missed as a colleague, friend and story-teller. She will be missed by every single person using Hangberg Library as well as our satellite library at Imizamo Yethu, where she worked three times a week.



We at Hangberg Library cannot really find the right words to describe our loss. We can only wish her all the best and assure her that she will always be in our thoughts and in our prayers.




sê uit die streekkantoor nie, want ons werk steeds saam. Sterkte en voorspoed in die nuwe pos.

Op 20 September 2002 het Macassar Biblioteek sy 20-jarige bestaansjaar asook die rekenarisering van die biblioteek gevier. Terselfdertyd is die nuwe saal van die biblioteek ook ingewy.

Hierdie spoggeleentheid is bygewoon deur raadslede van die Helderberg Munisi-

pale Owerheid, gemeenskapslede, vriende van die biblioteek en personeel van die Provinsiale Biblioteekdiens se streekkantoor.

Macassar Biblioteek speel 'n sleutelrol as inligtingverskaffer in die gemeenskap. Die biblioteek is deur een van die gassprekers as 'n 'baken' in Macassar geloof.

Macassar Biblioteek was voorheen onder die beheer van die Kaapse Metropolitaanse Raad. LITERÊRE TOEKENNINGS

M-Net Boek Prys skok

Die M-Net Boek Prys vir onderskeidelik Engelse en Afrikaanse letterkunde, die grootste letterkundepryse in die land, gaan nie meer toegeken word nie.

Tot verlede jaar is die M-Net Boek Prys in die kategorieë Afrikaans, Engels, Sotho, Nguni en Tsonga/Venda toegeken. Die weners van die eerste vier kategorieë het elk R50 000 gekry, en dié van die laaste R25 000.

Vanjaar het M-Net aangekondig dat sy fokus voortaan op inheemse tale is en dat hy R20 000 gaan toeken aan die weners in

die kategorieë vir Nguni, Sotho, Tsonga en Venda, asook van die kykNET Jong Skrywers Prys. Laasgenoemde prys word toegeken vir 'n Afrikaanse roman geskryf deur iemand jonger as 35 jaar.

Die verlies van dié pryse moet gemeet word teen die feit dat Suid-Afrikaanse Engelse skrywers vir verskeie internasionale pryse soos die Booker en die Statebond Prys in aanmerking kan kom. Die Afrikaanse letterkunde het ook benewens gevestigde pryse soos die Nasboek, Akademie en ATKV Pryse onlangs die RAU Prys ryker geword. Tog bly die verlies van só 'n groot prys 'n gevoelige slag. In dié stadium is die kykNET Prys ook 'n skrale troos, aangesien bloedweinig skrywers jonger as 35 verlede jaar gepubliseer het.

M-Net sal verantwoordelik wees vir bogenoemde pryse aan boeke in inheemse tale. Publikasies van enige Suid-Afrikaanse uitgewer kom in aanmerking. Nasboek sal steeds die WA Hofmeyer Prys vir beste Afrikaanse letterkundige werk, die Recht Malan Prys vir nie-fiksie, die MER Prys vir jeugliteratuur en die Herman Charles Bosman Prys vir Engelse letterkunde toeken. Dié pryse, wat verdubbel is tot R20 000 elk, is egter net vir publikasies uit die Nasboek-groep.



Publishing project flourishes

The Community Publishing Project (CPP) is proud to announce that two books have been published with the support of grants from the CPP.

The first is a book of Xhosa folk tales and songs written and published by Kholeka Sigenu from Queenstown, who is a member of Bhala, the national Xhosa Writers Group. The book is called **Ezakowethu**, and



is available directly from the publisher at R30,00 excluding postage costs. The book, suitable for children and adults, can be ordered from PO Box 1763, Queenstown, 5320.

The second book, **On the road of hope**, is a collection of stories told by disabled women from Khayelitsha and is available from the Zanempilo Disability Project, Division of Occupational Therapy, University of Cape Town, Main Road, Observatory, 7925, Cape Town.

Two more books are still in the process of being published. They are an anthology of texts by members of the Afrikaanse Skrywersvereniging and an anthology of writings by members of Bhala in the Eastern Cape. These projects will receive mentoring from editors at NB Publishers, and help to cover the costs of production of a first edition. Funds generated from the sale of the books will go towards reprinting and financing a new book by the group.
