Other DC Comic Trades The Flash

Wally West is the Flash, the fastest man alive (yes, even faster than Superman). Since the early nineties, the Flash along with Batman has been one of the consistent best sellers for the company. The reason for this - writer Mark Waid and his inexplicable ability to write a really good story. Subsequently Waid has handed over writing responsibilities to Geoff Johns, who, along with writing partner David Goyer, a very successful Hollywood screen writer, have taken the industry by storm.

Justice League of America (JLA)

Is the first superhero team-up book that brought Superman and Batman, amongst others, into one book. The Justice League is almost as old as DC.

The JLA was one of the biggest surprises for fans and parent company DC. It became, and still is, so popular that it outsells big name books like Superman and Batman. Justice League featured hot British writer Grant Morrison, crafting epic stories that propelled this comic up the sales charts. Even after Morrison left to write X-Men, JLA has still maintained it's best seller status - scribes Mark Waid and Joe Kelley have seen to that.

Green Arrow Quiver (Kevin Smith)

Writer and independent film director, Kevin Smith's second foray into mainstream comics, proved to be such a hit it put Green Arrow in the number one slot on the sales chart for the first time ever. This comic trade collects the first eight issue story arc, written by Smith.

Nightwing (Chuck Dixon and Scott McDaniel)

'Featuring high-octane action, lots of cool villains and a Superman team up' (Wizard 2002:64) Nightwing rocks. Dick Grayson, Robin in his youth, has carved out a world for himself away from his mentor, Batman as Nightwing. In these trades Dick proves that he can stand on his own two feet and finally be out of the shadow of Batman.

Kingdom come (Mark Waid and Alex Ross)

One of the best award-winning works of the nineties, it is also considered to be one of the best-painted (not drawn) comics in the history of comics. Comic book painter, Alex Ross cemented his reputation as the best in the business and Mark Waid earned his title as Uber-scribe.

MARVEL

Marvel comics has an uncanny ability to reinvent their comic books. Fans' reaction are usually mixed but lately Marvel comics can do no wrong. Its two imprints, Marvel Knights and the Ultimate line, have become even more popular than their main line comics. However, the money makers and fan favourite will always be the X-Men.

Ultimate Line

Marvel comics' Ultimate line, is a re-envisioning of main line comic book characters. Writers are given creative licence to reinvent and redefine old characters and create new stories for them. The stories are all targeted for a wider audience and are



less edgier than other Marvel titles and imprints.

superhero fare into an edgy, funny and dramatic hybrid that never fails to impress.

With Sandman ending its run in the late 90s and Gaiman leaving to work on other projects, parent company DC was afraid that without its flag title the Vertigo line



would loose it's readership base. It was with mixed feelings that they agreed to publish *Preacher*, the creation of a British writer with a penchant for graphic violence and westerns. Ennis, one of a talented group

of English writers making their mark in American comics, and his subsequent success was controversial to say the least. Preacher tells the story of a man who speaks with the voice of God. Along with a former lover and a welsh vampire, the trio set off across America and the world, looking for God, who has abandoned heaven. Custers' purpose for his search, to hold God accountable for his behaviour.

Preacher has been called blasphemous, horrible, graphically violent, sinful, disgusting and just plain evil but what most agree on, is that Ennis and artist Steve Dillon, have created and told an excellent story. Be warned, these trades are not for the faint of heart and certainly adults only.

Before *Preacher*, Ennis cut his teeth on Vertigo's other staple title, *Hellblazer*. With his trademark style, Ennis tells the continuing story of occult investigator and bad boy, John Constantine. Not quite possessing any particular supernatural power, Constantine one of the most feared beings in Britain besides, you know who, tries to lead a relatively normal self-destructive life while still handling all the 'other things' in his life.

Ennis puts Constantine through his paces and it's a brilliant read.

When Ennis left Hellblazer for Preacher, Azzarello had the hard job of taking over a book at the height of it's popularity and didn't disappoint fans at all. Azzarello's broody, hard-hitting style tears the lid off of the darkness that lurks in the souls of men. Coupling a brilliant mystery and an unexpected conclusion to a journey

through America, Azzarello has had one of the most successful runs on Constantine since Ennis started writing the title.

Azzarrello continues his winning streak, with this excellent crime story that has a vicious exciting twist in the tale. What if you could kill the one person who did you wrong, the one person who to all intents and purposes has irrevocably changed your life for the worst. What if someone gave you 100 bullets and said that they are untraceable and that you could kill this person without reprisal. What would you do?

• Grant Morrison

Before Morrison led the JLA to unexpected heights, he created this series. *The Invisibles* tells the story of a group of downand-out revolutionaries trying to overthrow the system. It's typical mind-bending vintage Morrison, that leaves you breathless. (Apparently Morrison sued the creators of **The matrix**, the hit-action movie, because he felt they stole the idea from his work, *The Invisibles*).

Another dystopian story, told by another brilliant British writer. *Transmetropolitan* has received numerous accolades for its brilliant writing. *Transmetropolitan* tells the story of journalist Spider Jerusalem and his attempts to bring President Gary (the Smiler) to justice. A bit of a feat when you're a lowly journalist and the biggest criminal around is the president.

Funny, hard hitting and insightful, Ellis never gives an inch and never lets it get dull.
