

BOYS HIT IN MITCHELLS PLAIN CROSSFIRE

Armed Pagad team held after shootings

A SLEEPING TEENAGER was dragged out of his home and shot eight times by a large group of armed men early yesterday day. Later, a group attacked the home of American merchant and drug dealer Magedat Hadka Magedat. **JUDY DAWSON and LINDZ VAN ZILLA report.**

ELISHI Pagad supporters were arrested in Malakal, two days after an battle yesterday afternoon between a larger group of Averydienko and Magedat hadka.

Malakal, a top narcotics and gun dealer in gang and self-confessed impsilite.

The daylight attack on Magedat's house at Elisa Way, Lost City, was the second of a string of attacks that had begun with an early morning hand grenade and gun attack at Tarienberg Way, a few hours earlier.

Levi Kerechets, 13, died after being shot twice, and two 3-year-old boys and a man were seriously injured in the later attack between Malakal and the station.

The two boys and Mr Benjamin Kerechets, 20, who was also wounded, were hospitalized under guard again.

Local legal representatives, Mr Quarmishai, confirmed last night that eight of the organization's leaders had been arrested. He said it is to apply to the Michaelson Magistrate's Court to hold Malakal.

War in the Lost City

• 1.30pm: Driven Kerechets, 13, is dragged from his home in Tarienberg Way, Lost City, by heavily-armed men who have arrived in convoy. Decks in which eight times and left for dead by the men, who also shot hands, grenades and shoot at the house. Decks dies a New York Merc.

• 2.30pm: The same convoy of about 25 cars return to the Tarienberg Way house in Lost City. They shoot their guns and chase Mrs Padukh Norma and three children, who have come to offer condolences, down the street. Magedat and children is the street fire to come. No shots are fired.

• Seconds later six of the cars break away from the convoy and leave to nearby Edita Street, where they stop outside the home of drug dealer and his American band member Mr Magedat Hadka Magedat.

• A short road leads between the attractions and Magedat, who is the only occupant of the house to return fire.

• Two 35-year-old boys in the house and Mr Bertramie Madigas, who lives on the property, are seriously wounded in the shootout. They are taken to Goodwill Hospital.

• Magedat returns fire and wounds two of the attackers who retreat to their cars and drive off at high speed.

• Police arrive on the scene minutes later and give chase. Three of the men are arrested a short distance away. Eight Pagad supporters are arrested and seven houses confiscated.

His sister says she cannot understand why they killed her uninvited guests. She said he had no links with gang.

"It sounded like Hadise," she said. "I grabbed my gun and ran to the back room. By then they had driven."

The younger occupants of the house dived to cover while Kerechets' sister crawled under the bed to the neighbors for help.

The neighbor had already alerted police who arrived after the attack later.



Police cut off three of the cars, arrested eight men and confiscated seven firearms.

City seeks Eviction

Tafelsig 'land invaders' told to be out by Monday

Squatters 'tired' of living conditions

People who have invaded public land in Tafelsig, Mitchell's Plain, illegally have been given a three-day notice to move peacefully - or be evicted on Monday.

This was the outcome of a meeting yesterday between officials of the Cape Town municipality, the police, justice department and representatives of the community who have erected about 200 shacks on municipal land in the past week.

Officials said the action seemed to be a "very significant and apparently well-orchestrated land invasion". Late yesterday more people were moving on to the land and erecting shacks.

The meeting, initiated by the police, was called to explain to community representatives the implications of a court order granted to the council by the Cape High Court enabling it to remove the invaders.

At a press conference after the meeting, the leader of the council delegation, Salene Moerane, said the community representatives had said they were tired of the conditions

to treat all people fairly," said Ms Moerane.

The council wanted to handle the situation in a "calm" way and had decided to give people three days to comply and move peacefully before implementing the court order.


"We want to resolve this in a manner which will not lead to violence, conflict and tension in surrounding communities," said Ms Moerane.

Although she said she was hopeful of an amicable outcome, it was his personal assessment, judging from the meeting, that the people were not prepared to move voluntarily.

The city's handling of the housing issue has come under the spotlight recently with officials that there about whether to act against basing controversial members accused of harbouring the eviction of illegal tenants.

But yesterday the council formed a united front with all parties strongly condemning land invasions and saying that strong action needed to be taken to halt similar behaviour in future.

The families occupying the land are to be notified in writing of the court action - and notices will also be put up in the area.

Tafelsig People's Association resists Eviction

Squatters cry betrayal as mass eviction looms

Council seeks court order in face of pre-election 'disruption campaign'

People on the housing waiting list in the Pretoria area will be unable to accommodate all those on Tafelkloof's waiting list.

Local government officials have been aware of the problem since last year, but nothing has been done to address it. Mr Michael Mitchell, the town councilor for the central Pretoria ward, says five families were forced to stay in single rooms.

Others had to make do with single beds in other people's backyards and were left to change laundry while a staff of 13 students from a branch school were quartered there.

When a concerned citizen approached Tafelkloof's mayor, Mr. David Phele, "he said the council and the national government had to work together. The national will seek a High Court injunction to stop the demolition," says Mr. Phele.

The squatters, who say they have given notice to the people living there, are trying to fight them off, "she said. Once bad news informed local residents that a bid was to be made to remove the home of one of the women in the dormitory, they started raising the money.

Most of the victims were young girls who were dragged into bathtubs, raped and killed. There has also been a notable increase in sex activity. "Our people have had a place of respite for a long time. We don't feel safe here," said Mrs. Mary Lamp, 45, whose family of four was living in a shack on a hillside. "We are suffering too much," said Mrs. Lamp.

One family, whose house was destroyed during the demolition, is fighting for their right to live in an overcrowded house.

Elisabeth Davis, 30, said her family of six were homeless for a long time after their shack was demolished.

"There was no shelter at all and we have nowhere else to go," she said.

Her home, which was demolished on Saturday, had been occupied by squatters. Her son, aged 10, died in the attack. His body was found in a nearby stream. His mother said he was a "wastrel" who had no respect for his parents.

It was discovered that the attack had occurred in a "wasteland" between the Tafelkloof and Crossroads areas. It is believed that the squatters had been threatening the community in the run up to the elections.

It was believed that the council had received information that the people occupying the Tafelkloof area were from the ANC. They had been recorded as being present on a succession of occasions. The incident has been described as a "disruption campaign" by the ANC.

The invaders had told council officials they were from Driftwood Park and sought shelter. Mayor Phele, the chairman of the former Crossroads ward, said he was a National Party member of the provincial legislature.

The council's executive director of social uplift services, Mr. Mike Msimang, said his office would seek an injunction to prevent the removal of the squatters from the high court before the elections, while seeking more funds, said Mr. Msimang.

"We see this as a threat even though we have months," said Mr. Msimang. "First it was Crossroads, with the invasion of social uplift services, then an account of occupation took place. The record set of people in Crossroads and its property in Crossroads and an application for an injunction against an African National Congress member, Dr. Sizwe Kana, showed that a campaign like the one before the election was being waged."

Mr. Msimang said Mr. Elisa had been trying to disrupt the election. "All the evidence was available to us but we were not able to act because of the nature of the disruption campaign," he said.

Problem: Delay of Construction

Challenges

- internal crisis in Freedom Park, because of lack of social capital and democratic structures (accountability, transparency,...)
- division of community due to interference from politicians - need for more effective protection
- regarding emergency service provision: promises by the City were badly implemented - lack of control mechanisms

Challenges

Planning Process:

- City's project manager tried to exclude community representatives from planning process
- Existing projects which strengthen Freedom Park's social and economic capital were not integrated into the upgrading project.
- Identification of beneficiaries: Project Manager accommodated as little people from Freedom Park as possible in favour of the waiting list.

Challenges

Planning:

- Needs of community were misinterpreted or neglected
- Needs of individuals were not provided for (in terms of a range of options to choose from).
- Technical standards left little room to respond to specific conditions in Freedom Park.
