Promotional material



Two posters aimed at adults, one that depicts a soccer stadium with the penalty corner and the words


Read the game, Lees die spel, Funda Umdlalo written on the soccer pitch; and the other with the slogan, Eat, breathe, read soccer.

Flags of all countries partici-


pating in the 2010 World Cup.
