On-Scene Media Management

- Treat the media as a partner.
- Ensure the safety of the media during the emergency operation.
- Ensure operations are not effected by the media.
- Meet media needs for information.
- Be proactive with the story and photo/video opportunities.
- Ensure all organisational policies are followed during the release of information.








Integrated System

The mission remains getting the right information to the right people at the right time so they can make the right decisions.





Joint Information Principles

- Supports Incident Command
- Coordinated & integrated across jurisdictions and across functional agencies
- Unified message to be presented to the public & the media.
- Organisations retain their independence.



Life Safety Strategy

Public information, education strategies, and communications plans help ensure that numerous audiences receive timely, consistent messages about:

- Life saving measures.
- Evacuation routes.
- Threat and alert system notices.
- Other public safety information.




Benefits of Media Programme


- Public understands department services & programmes
- Brings department to the attention of officials and decision makers
- Promotes department successes to community – builds community equity
- Builds organisational self-esteem
- Promotes fire & life safety education



Public Information Officer Training (NFPA 1035)

- NFPA 1035 standard identifies the levels of professional performance required for Public Information Officers.
- Indicates the skills necessary to facilitate the needs of local media, while disseminating priority information by the fire & rescue services including public fire & life safety messages.
- PIO course is designed to develop basic skills for fire and emergency service personnel for conducting on-scene media interviews.







Specific Outcome Objectives

- Conduct media interviews
- Establish a media area
- Coordinate dissemination of information to non-media groups
- Write a news release
- Write a media advisory
- Disseminate information to the media
- Disseminate information to department personnel
- Coordinate a press conference


